SPEAKING PARTS 1 - 2

- There are <u>4 parts</u> in the <u>PET Speaking Part</u>. It takes 10 to 12 minutes per pair of candidates approximately.
- It shows how good your spoken English is, as you take part in a <u>conversation by asking/answering questions</u> and talking.
- You will be talking about your <u>family</u>, <u>home life</u>, <u>daily</u> <u>routine</u>, <u>likes/dislikes</u>, <u>education</u>, <u>job</u>, <u>travel</u>, <u>hobbies</u>, <u>holidays/weekends</u>.
- Your Speaking test will be conducted face to face with 1 or 2 other candidates and 2 examiners. This makes your test more realistic and more reliable.

PET (PRELIMINARY ENGLISH TEST) HOW TO DO PART 1-TIPS

When thinking about your answers, there are certain things you will need to remember or do:

- The first thing the examiner will ask you to do, is to handle him/her your mark sheets
- Always listen carefully to the examiner instruction.
- ► Your <u>must not</u> give just one word answer, for instance:

Question: Do you work or do you study?

Answer: Study

Use complete answers, these type of answers sound natural and friendly and they use more language.

► You have to **spell** either your name or surname.

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In this part, you will be asked a series of personal information questions:

- ▶ 1. What's your surname? My surname is
- ▶ 2. How do you spell it? J-I-M-E-N-E-Z
- 3. Where do you live?/ Where do you come from? Name of village/town/city and country.
 Some information about where it is, an adjective to describe it, the number of inhabitants
- ▶ 4. Do you work or are you a student in ...?/ What do you do/ study? Subject and place of study, type of course, job title, type of company, how many years you have worked there, if you enjoy it
- ▶ 5. Do you enjoy studying English? Why (not)? Your feelings about English, how long you have been studying
- ▶ 6. Do you think that English will be useful for you in the future? Ways of using English in future career, studies, personal life
- 7. What did you do yesterday evening / last weekend? Name more than one activity, your feelings, how long you spent doing them
- 8. What do you enjoy doing in your free time? Name more than one activity, how often you do them, why you like them, etc

(Select one or more questions from the list to ask each candidate. Use candidates' names throughout. Ask Candidate B first.)

Do you think that English will be useful for you in Will you use English in the future?

What did you do yesterday evening / last Did you do anything yesterday evening / last weekend? What?

What do you enjoy doing in your free time? What do you like to do in your free time?


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SPEAKING PART 2...

- In this part you will be given a **situation**, and you will talk about **that** situation with your partner.
- This is not a role play but you are given a situation to talk about.
- It is important to have an interactive communication with your partner.
- You will be given a visual material: some pictures to give you ideas to talk about.

While you are watching and listening to the sample Part 2, think about these questions.

- 1. Do they discuss all options?
- 2. Do they both speak equally? Why / why not? Do they give reasons for their opinions?
- 3. Does either candidate do the following?
 - start the activity
 - make a suggestion
 - ask the other's opinion
 - show a preference
 - agree or disagree
 - keep the discussion going
 - sum up

- Language for giving and asking for opinions e.g. I think, what do you think?


